

This Week in Labor History:

On April 20th, 1914, the Colorado National Guard killed at least five coal miners along with thirteen women and children in Los Animas County, CO, in what came to be known as the Ludlow Massacre. The governor of Colorado deployed the National Guard to break up a tent colony of striking miners who had demanded that the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company recognize the miners' union, the United Mineworkers.
